

TERRIBLY MANGLED.

William Robbins, Living Near Horton, Meets a Horrible Death.

William Robbins, a farmer living near Hortonville, was killed in the harvest field on the farm of the Hon. Thomas J. Lindley, by being caught in a binder while cutting oats, Monday afternoon. He was stooping over the binder attempting to make some repairs on the machine, when the horses started, throwing him directly in front of the sickle bar. One leg and one arm were cut off before he was rescued from his awful position.

He died while being conveyed to his home. A widow and five children survive him.

Surveyors Making Progress.

Two surveying parties are at work on the route of the Central traction company. The one that left Indianapolis the first of the week reached Westfield Thursday and will come directly to this city, and stopping at the old toll gate on the Westfield pike on Federal Hill, where the other party started out. The party that is working north from here reached the township line Wednesday. It has 42 miles to survey, the route extending both to Kokomo and Elwood, and it will require at least eighteen days to complete the work. The managers of the company say the contract for the grading will be let as soon as the surveying is finished.
