The Foulke Murder Trial.

As will be seen by reference to our report, the **Foulke** trial began on Tuesday and has progressed rapidly up to the closing of the columns of the Ledger. The interest at first was not great, but has increased gradually, and is now claiming the almost undivided attention of the public mind. Our report includes the examination of but one new witness, the nephew of Dr. Amos Pettijohn, who was present at his house when Mr. **Foulke** came to procure the aid of the Doctor immediately after the murder. His testimony bears upon the question as to what was said about the pocket book at the house of Mr. Pettijohn. It will be observed that all the witnesses adhere to their testimony as given in the former trial; there is the same discrepancy as to what Lucette said when she raised up in bed just before her death, and spoke; Louis Pettijohn still says she said "he killed me" as Amasa passed at that moment to the kitchen. Dr. Pettijohn and Cammack both state it differently. It will be observed that Gen. Moss has been added to the counsel for the State. This is

right; Mr. Moss should never have been dismissed from the case, as he, better than any other man, with his ability and understanding of the case, was able to take care of the State's interest in it; and Major Gordon, a criminal lawyer of great ability, having been added to the counsel for defense, rendered the employment of Mr. Moss a duty to the State. And we say all this with due deference to the ability of the other members of our bar. The prisoner is represented by Thomas J. Kane, J. W. Evans and Major Jonathan W. Gordon; and the State by Joel Stafford, Prosecuting Attorney, Judge William Garver and David Moss, Esq. We regret our inability to get any more of the evidence than we print, but our paper must go to press at the regular hour. The proceedings are complete up to Thursday morning. The remainder, with the full details of the closing of the trial will appear next week. The examination of witnesses for defense began Thursday morning.
