

Civil War Review

May 20, 1864 In Georgia campaigning continued at Cartersville, along the Etowah River, near Cartersville and at Allatoona Mills, Georgia.

The 13th Kentucky Cavalry listed 2 men killed in battle at Mayfield, Kentucky.

The Missouri State Militia skirmished at Lamar, Missouri.

Grant left his Spotsylvania lines in an attempt to flank Gen. Lee. Skirmishes were reported at Milford Station, Drewry's Bluff and Downey's Bridge, Virginia. Fighting at Ware Bottom Church resulted in 103 killed, 796 wounded and 49 missing, Union dispatches said.

Pvt. William Jacobs of Cicero and a member of Co. "C" 130th Indiana Regiment died of disease at Chattanooga, Tennessee.

May 21, 1864 The 124th Indiana Infantry moved into Rome, Georgia. The 125th Illinois Infantry was at Kingston, Georgia.

The 2nd Colorado Cavalry lost 1 killed, 1 wounded and 1 missing in battle at Sni Hills along the Blue River, Missouri.

Union forces began operations at James Island, South Carolina.

Fighting continued at Bowling Green, United States Ford, Newton and Guinea Station and actions at Fott Powhatan, Milford Station and Stannard's Mill, all in Virginia.

May 22, 1864 Fighting continued at Cassville, Georgia, as Gen. Sherman continued his "Atlanta" Campaign.

The 6th Missouri Cavalry was in the area of Old River, Louisiana.

The 4th Missouri Cavalry reported 2 killed, 1 wounded and 10 missing near Mt. Pleasant, Mississippi.

In Virginia, across the North Anna River, Gen. Grant began operations following the river line. Battle casualties were reported at 184 killed, 942 wounded, 145 captured and missing.
