Adams, William, and others, made Trustees of the Wilmington meeting property, 6.18.1831. His wife Anna was a Quaker and became the farm in the S. W. corner of Wilmington, long occupied as a nursery of trees, by Lee Watty. Their houses were situated in Friend's green yard at the west end of Burttree Street, Wilmington. They and their three sons by side till the year you are noted as having purchased the remains of the land named, whenon Jacob Quincy and David B. Burleigh the then Trustee of the Society, gave the sum, by Adams' direction, to the Village of Wilmington, not far from 1855.

Adair, Barbara Ann - was Scott - was a widow 11.30.1848, for outgoing in marriage and joining another Society.

Allison, Abraham - lived with his family about 3/4 of a mile nearly west of Center meeting house. Was made Clerk of one instance in about 1827-1828, 9-10.1828, and held the position for quite a while. He became a Quaker and a true Anti-Slavery man, and was noted as a Station keeper and conductor on the "Underground Rail Road." While he was an extremely upright, skillful and useful man. However, in his anti-slavery position, he was not moderate enough to please the controlling members of his Socy., which, 4.13.1843, disowned him for signing a protest or disclaimer directed against an approved minister of another yearly meeting than Indiana. (i.e. George F. White, of N.Y. City, who, however was not named in the charge brought against him.) White signed the methods of the extreme section abolitionists.

B. Harlan, the son, was the father of Elias D. Harlan, and lived on the west side of the Lempke road about a mile west of Colton, where said Elias now lives. The latter has served at least two terms as member of the Ohio house of Representatives.

Helson, Letitia (sometimes given as Letitia H.), accepted 5.21.1831,
from Baltimore on, m. for the western District, and certified 9.15.1832
to Springfield on, m., Warren County, Ohio.
as to these Helson - Jane was full sister to Samuel, and made
her home with him. Letitia was their half sister, and became
the second wife of Zephaniah Loomis who was somehow related to
Samuel Helson's children, or part of them, for to whom Samuel
was twice married, his first wife having been the above
Rebecca Loomis (sister of Zephaniah) who was the mother
of Edward J. above, if not of other of the children. Said
Edward J. was the husband of Letitia Hester, now of Springfield,
who was probably somewhat related to him, for they were both
Helsons. Susan R. (in Swannah) served her m. on, in
various capacities, while a member of the Cestertians.

The father of this family was some grade of cousin to Schizophila Hieatt, whom see, and the Mother, Ann was daughter of Isaac and Phenia Perkins, the latter nee Loomis. Hieatt, Sister of Otto John and Zephaniah Loomis and of Sabina (Loomis) Moore and — (Leman) Laines, wife, respectively, of James Moore and Jacob Haines, all early settlers near Center.
The home of Elizabeth and Ann was long an old fashioned brick house on the east side of the Lewis road, nearly 6 miles northward of Wilmington but in extreme age they were removed with their son-in-law and daughter, Lee, Joseph and Sarah Whitney, and there they died. Both had been active members of their m. on. She often served at Colkt. The daughter, Hieatt, Sarah, before her marriage and afterwards, served her m. in various capacities. She intermarried with Joseph Whitney 5.23.1833 and so became Sarah Whitney. (See Joseph Whitney). The son

Hieatt, Isaac P. married one of the sons of Greer, he made satisfaction in account thereof. His wife was widow member. They lived many years on a farm on the west side of the Lewis road about a mile south of Connelton, Clinton Co. O. but as occasion they moved into Hart village, where she died, and he still lately, lives. The son

Hieatt, Alice, married, and lived in a large brick house on the west side of the same Lewis road about 6 miles northward of Wilkington, O. He forfeited his membership by outgoing in marriage, and had various trials and losses, and when Lewis died, committed suicide.

Hieatt, Mary Ann, another daughter, married 2.20.1845 to Samuel

W. Bassett, who so changed her name. (See Wm. Bassett & fam.)

After the death of her husband she moved to Wilmington, Ohio and there contracted a second marriage - with Asaiah Le Wall, but the union was not happy and they separated. She died of cancer of the face at her home on South street, leaving a quite large estate.

Heatt, Savannah, (commonly called Susan) was converted and in the mid summer, before her outgoing in marriage with Brazile Lamm. For the breach of peace she made due acknowledgment, and retained her right. In 1865 she and her family lived on a farm near her father, later they were a while in Richmond, and ^{2d} later in several different places not far from Carter and Wilmington. Her husband who was a son of the pioneer John W. Lamm (Starbuck), deceased, died a year or two ago, and she, a widow, lives with her son-in-law and daughter, Damon G. & Anna Fox in Springfield, Ohio. For a number of years last past she has been an Orthodox Friend. The daughter

Heatt, Lydia, by marriage changes her name to Lydia Stumpf and b. 1.5.1846, was adored for outgoing in marriage.

Heatt, Narcissa, another daughter paid some attention to her own until 7.17.1857 made her a representative to the evening Mt. The daughter Heatt, Phenia, who married Stanley Oglebee in a manner inconsistent with Friends' rules, but she made satisfaction with her Friends ^{5.11.1864} and continues a member. However she cannot appear to be a member now. She lives with her husband and family about a mile west of Lancaster, O.

Heatt, Anna Cook, the youngest child took a wife who has been long deceased. She married as accomplished otherwise than by Friends' rules but 6.7.1852, he made satisfactory acknowledgment, and preserved his right in the society. Has three sons of Lancaster and east of it, and perhaps elsewhere being now settled near Buck Run I think, 2 or 3 miles S.E. of Lancaster.

Heatt, Mary Ann - (possibly her maiden name was Davis) having gone over in marriage, made satisfaction 7.18.1859 and was confirmed 8 months. To whom she later, 9.19.1859, she was assigned to Fall Creek M. & S., Eighteen Co. O. I think.

Heatt, Christopher - and Emma Liveridge with a family, live about 1/4 mile Westward of Martinsville, Clinton Co. O. Were members of Newberry meeting, and of Fall Creek, later Cleavest, now in High-

land County, Ohio. Christopher and Emma of the family were attached to Centenary upon the laying corner of Clara Parkman in 1854. He was a sterling Friend and public spirited citizen. His wife and his family are now members of the Holgate branch of Friends. Several of them are Orthodox.

Heatt, Martha, or Martha D. - married Heatt after her marriage which was accomplished out of the order of Friends. She made satisfaction for her outgoing, 1.20.1852, and, 1.13.1853 took certificate to White Sulphur, Ind. Before marriage her spouse was Huston and she filled many positions and rendered much service in her own town. Under what is possible this Martha Huston was daughter of another Martha Huston, whose maiden name I have not learned, who having married a Friends man, made satisfaction 3.15.1839. Most likely it was the same woman in each case, the first husband having died. Of course there may have been two Martha Huston, one mother and daughter, one Martha & the other Martha D. year of my.

Hines, Nathaniel I am not sure, but presume these were Hines, Sarah, 3 years and wife, and the Sarah was daughter of Friends Joseph Doan. He had a daughter who married Hines and became the mother of Jonathan D. Hines, and Jesse Hines and perhaps other children, and having been left a widow married George Shields, was his 2d wife - near Mendon, in Hamlin Co.

Warren Co. - Nathan was made representative to the Mt. with John Perkins, Abram Aller and William McMillan, 11.15.1828, and again 10.20.1832, with Stephen Brewerton, Elizabeth Heatt and Kiram Mendonhall. And Sarah was made like representative, with Ruth Wherry, Margaret Salvin and Ruth Leonard, 1.18.1829.

Hackett, Jacob, son of Joseph and Ruth (Jackson) Hackett, the latter daughter of the noted old one-eyed preacher Jacob Jackson, died about the close of 1841 in the 77th year of his age. Said Jacob Hackett married for a 2d wife the widow Ross Roman, nee Brown, who was not then a member, but joined afterwards, and finally settled with her husband and children on the first side of the Susquehanna midway between Waynesboro and Hanney'sburg. Having become members of Hilliard M. & S. upon the laying corner of Carpenter in 1864, while yet living among the old Newberry Friends, near Martinsville.

The father, David S. Stetson, was I presume, a Bingham Friend - indeed it is not doubtful, and I presume his first wife Ruth was seen, as was their son Stephen T. Stetson. Dr. Russell of Harris, the author of his Friends, was admitted to membership, 4/18/1829. David and Harriet had numerous important tasks in their power, and he and Ruth May were respectively clergies of the two departments of our only Center in N. H., held by mutual agreement at Wiltonington 14.8.1828. - Other Friends then occupying the meeting house at Center, Thenceforth Center was our best report to Minnie. Ruth, Harriet was sister of Sister Hinman, one of the wife of the late Charles A. Hinman.

Of the children.

Stetson, Stephen T., for outgoing in marriage, was admitted 8.16.1841. - Stetson, Amanda, for outgoing in marriage with Asaph W. Doan - (Col. Doan Judge Doan, Jr.) was admitted 9.13.1849. (See Doan, Amanda) She died not very long after her marriage, leaving no son, (Carroll Doan, who married Eliza Ellen Whitney daughter of Shem and Mary Jane (Haines) Whitney, which showed her son of Joseph and cousin to Joseph Stark, Harriet Stark's son and)

Stetson, Edward Lyons, married aside from Friends' method, but made acceptable acknowledgment, 10.18.1853, and was continued a member. After the family became members of Hinman m. m., upon the laying down of Center m. m. the parents and two children were certified to know nothing m. m. (See 2d Vol. Annual minutes, Hinman m. m., pp. 295) I have no present further knowledge of the family, only I may add that David's parents were Joseph and Theodora (Norman) Stetson the latter more than first cousin to my grandmother Rachel (Norman) Butterworth, for their father was brother to Charles Butterworth and Michael Norman, and Rachel's grandmother, Anna (Child) Terrell was a Colgate - hence it is believed of Colonel Child who was Garrison's grandfather, making the two old ladies first cousins + 2d, cousins.

Stetson, May, Mrs. Stott. - (See Stott, May) Was charged with outgoing in marriage, and as she had never within the limits of all m. m. (Publ. by C.) that meeting was asked to deal with her. It probably did so to satisfy action, as we find, 12.17.1853, her membership was certified to that meeting.

Summer, Absalom. Long a member of Fall Creek m. m.; later named Clearcreek, and became a member of Center m. m. when Clearcreek m. m. closed in 1851, in common with the other members there. His

 her. Later Mary became a member or commencement, and for ought I know
 her first six sons may have admitted with her. This was probably in Penna,
 and it may be that this brought her right (and the children's if they were then
 members) to center or in before the Division of 1845. or the children
 may have been admitted at center before the birth of Ernest. The family
 lived in those days south of Dover some distance and must have constituted
 part of the membership of Dover soon after it was organized in 1824, or soon
 after it was re-organized, for their right may have been brought to Dover
 in or directly from the west. Some time after Mary joined Anna was
 admitted to membership, also, and he and his wife were plain Quaker Friends all their remaining days. - but during their man in various capacities,
 he especially. Center minutes indicate that on his application
 9.15.1832, "he and his three minor children, ^{and} *Rebecca*, Thomas Brown and Barbara
 Jane, after a visit from a committee in the usual order, were received
 into membership." If the minutes are correct, that must have been the
 time of his settlement, and the names of it, and those three children were
 not before that members of the Society at all. But it is possible the
 whole family were members before, and that Anna and those three children
 were now accepted at center without certificate. He died Friends, not having
 any Dover members - but in that case the minute is lame. One way
 or another all the children and the mother, as well as the father, came
 to be received by the man at center as its members. The son Isaac
 was accepted from Carmel, Ohio, on or. 8.9.1847, but how he came to have
 a right there, I have not learned. Later he was certified to Miami on or
 9.19.1841, and finally settled in Hamilton County, Ind., having married Cath-
 erine Dakin who afterwards became a member with Friends. But to re-
 turn to the father - After his wife, Mary, died he married, 1.17.1850, to
 Priscilla Lewis, nee Fleary, widow of Daniel Lewis of Highland Co.,
 Ohio, and 4.18.1850 was certified to Fall Creek, on or. Later, 7.14.1853,
 he and Priscilla were accepted or certified from the meeting, and later,
 4.13.1854, were certified with his sons William and Esther to Miami, and
 settled on a farm lying part in Clinton and part in Warren Co., Ohio
 lying north of the Waynesville & Wilmington Turnpike, on which it borders.
 There Anna died, and Esther, the youngest son, bought out the brood.

right and made the place his home, his step-mother moving to the vicinity of Richmond, Indiana, where she became a member of Whitewater Friends, and there she ended her days. She was the mother of our Friend Christopher Lewis, of Georgetown neighborhood, who at the old home of herself and Daniel Lewis, and of Anna and her self while they lived in Highland County, Ohio. She had other children of Rubens Underwood, whose names are more than I have at present.

Underwood Isaac: I have made mention of him in previous pages. And add here, that he got along in marriage with Catherine Behn he made satisfactory, and was continued a member, 8.14.1866.

The 3d son

Underwood John, married aside from Friends' order, but made an acknowledgment and was continued in Montpelier 2.17.1847. He was certified to Fall Creek m. m. Ind., 3.16.1853, and I believe he lived thereafter in Hamilton Co., that state.

The 4th son

Underwood Zephanius: having some time become a member of Miami or m. m. - perhaps on the laying down of Center m. m. in 1866 - married, under the care of the former, (Matilda) Downing, daughter of Jacob (dead) and Jane W. (McCurdy) Downing, the little cousin to the Zephanius, who was a very interesting and promising man, and prospered. Had own a and carried on a farm in the "Texas" neighborhood, 3 or 4 miles northeast of New Antioch, Clinton Co., O., but later settled in the west edge of Clinton County, about 2 miles east of Marysville, adjoining the old Amos Underwood home there, and there he remained till his death, and had 2 sons and 2 daughters. The next year his son married his widow's people, and brother-in-law, Eliza Underwood, who lives with her since at Zephanius's old home.

The 5th son,

Underwood Amos, left a widow and one daughter at his death on a farm near Zephanius's "Texas" farm, and I believe still belongs to the daughter, who lives with a husband and children, in New Antioch, Africa said. Amos' marriage was accomplished aside from Friends' rules but he made satisfaction and was continued a member, 2.15.1849.

The 6th son

Underwood Edwin: obtained a certificate to Westfield Ohio in m. m. 8.16.1851, in order to marry with Anna D. Stebbins (Stetton), daughter of William L. and Barbara (Brown) Stetton. Post, 3.16.1857 he was certified to Fall Creek m. m. Ind., and lived in the County of Hamilton, Africa said, I believe. The first daughter,

Underwood Ernest, who, at 20 years, became a member at Center with her father, 9.17.1862. She was appointed one of the representatives to the Ind. 10.17.1849. She aside from Friends' precepts, became the wife of Daniel Bailey, of the Down Settlement, in Clinton County, son of that Daniel Bailey who entered and lived on the Daniel Bailey Survey of Land there, No. 1613. She was abandoned by her husband, 10.14.1862. (See Bailey, Ernest.) The 7th son

Underwood Thomas: followed, became a member at Center as his father did so to the same time. Died young he came of age.

The second daughter

Underwood Fidelia: James became a member at Center at the last time also. She married under the care of her mother, 5.12, 1857, to James Moore. After her death (which may not have taken place till after the moving to Indiana) James was certified to Fall Creek m. m. Ind. 5.17.1855. He was however older than that. Quite likely he also settled in Hamilton County, Indiana.

Underwood William: married, aside from the care of Friends, Catharine Hammitt, daughter of James and (Bailey) Hammitt - the latter daughter of the deponent of said testimony of James and sister of Amos, that husband who was married to Catharine. William and Catharine had a good farm, plenty further north than the Bailey homestead, originally in the adjoining Survey of Land, to one M. Post Survey No. 2050. With his father, stepmother, and brother Edwin, he had been certified to Miami m. m. 4.13.1852. To that m. m. he made an acknowledgment, and was continued a member, and proved a valuable one. He prospered in his business, but owing to failing health, he gave out a while before his death and moved to California.

Underwood Eliza: I have already written of in part, and now add that he married first to Lettie Tuck, whose people

Lived in Warren Co., just west of Clarksville - about 12 miles west. She was not a member, and the marriage was not by Friends' method, but he made baptism with his son in Miami, and remains a Friend. Heller was a very pleasant woman, and friendly as well as friendly, and two of her children have become members. She died about 3 or 3½ years ago, of cancer of the stomach, and about 1½ years ago Eliba married his brother's widow who was also his cousin's daughter - (See Underwood, Elizabeth) His son, our friend Daniel Bailey Underwood occupied his late home - the last residence of his father Driscoll. Eliba has been a success as a farmer and fruit raiser, and prosperous after the manner of the Underwood family.

Underwood, Mary Ann *Underwood, Rebecca Jane* { Probably sisters.

There is scarcely a doubt that they were at least relatives of each other, and it is strongly probable that they were relatives of the Rev. and Anna Underwood, fugitives. Both were accepted 6/15/1854 on separate certificates from Carmel M. M. (Women's minute day Carmel P. - which I can't find, I think it is in Ohio). Observe, that the same year Isaac, son of Anna, was also accepted from Carmel M. M. They were probably Isaac's cousins. The certificates of these sisters were directed to Miami M. M. which addressed them to Center M. M. Mary Ann married a P. C. Esther in Ohio, or after going west. Both sisters went west, and became, de facto, members of Quakers M. M. in Marshall Co., Iowa, after Illinois, & Illinois, if not before.

Walker, Mardia *Walker, Rachel* { This Pioneer pair were accepted at Miami M. M. on 12/13/1864, and it appears they settled not far from Magnolia. They brought their certificate from Hesperus M. M., Greene Co., Pa. It appears they soon bought about 1000 acres of land in Hanes Valley, 16/1871, just north of the Wilmington, which lies between brothers Agel & William and his daughter - one of whom was Lydia, and married Joseph Smith and the other married a Babbs, and was the mother of that Henry Babbs whom General Webster shot in a dispute in the time of the war of the rebellion - about 1862-3. Later Mardia settled himself on the east side of South Street, near its mouth end, in what is the present Wilmington and lived in a big house, afterwards occupied a good while by Henry B. Crowley, at one time County Sheriff. He took certificate for himself and wife to Center M. M. 2/28/1875, and I suppose he settled there about that time. In the latter part of his life he was a poor white old fellow with blindness, and William Smith, his grandson, had me charge to wait on him and lead him wherever he wanted to walk. In 1888 when Danie Price and state all night with him, and then he turned over very delighful to them. Mr. Smith told me of it, and said "Oh,
