KREUGER GIVEN \$250,000,000 HERE

Investigation of the Match King's Financing Dis-closes Its Extent.

FOUND A RICH FIELD

New York, Dec. 16.—The investment of American capital in the Swedish Kreuger & Toll Company, through which Ivar Kreuger financed, managed and held his world-wide economic structure, was met this week "in excess of \$130,000,000." This figure was established through the testimony of Frank Hamilton, head of the statistical department of Lee, Higginson & Co., the firm that distributed Kreuger's securities here. Mr. Hamilton was questioned before Henry K. Davis, bankruptcy referee, by E. W. Bebevoise, on behalf of the American creditors of Kreuger & Toll.

Taken with figures of the same magnitude previously set before Oscar W. Ehrhorn, referee in the separate bankruptcy examination of the International Match Company, which Kreuger organized here to take over part of the capital stock of match companies owned by his Swedish company throughout the world, the total American capital investment in Kreuger's economic empire was in excess of \$250,000,000.

According to accountants' reports now in possession of Kreuger's creditor here, the American investment market supplied practically half the entire capital with which Kreuger built his world organization, most of it during the boom years of 1928 and 1929.

Mr. Hamilton testified in connection with the Kreuger & Toll flotation that Lee, Higginson & Co., as direct sellers, had knowledge of \$95,000,000 of American certificates of Kreuger & Toll participating debentures and \$26,000,000 of secured debentures, but that interest coupons presented to them as Kreuger's bankers Crawford last night.

showed additional American holdings making a Kreuger & Toll total "in excess of \$130,000,000."

The quantity of these "additional American holdings," which may have been marketed by Kreuger directly in this country through brokerage accounts established either in his own name or in the name of his personal agent, Anders Jordahl, or Jordahl & Co., continued to engage the bankruptcy inquiries here with a view to determining where Kreuger got these securities and what right he had to sell them.

ORGANIZE QUICKLY.

Democrats Have No Trouble Electing Assembly Officers.

Indianapolis, Dec. 16.—With virtually no opposition, men appointed by Governor-elect Paul V. McNutt were named here yesterday to head Democratic majorities that will prevail in the 1933 session of the Indiana general assembly.

It took members of the house to be just a few minutes to elect Earl Crawford of Milton, as their speaker, Edward H. Stein of Bloomfield, was chosen floor leader, and Frank Finney of Martinsville, was selected caucus chairman.

The Democratic members of the next senate, with equal speed, chose Anderson Ketchum of Greensburg, as president pro tempore, and Walter S. Chambers of New Castle, as caucus chairman. Senator Addison Drake of Fairbanks was chosen caucus secretary.

Crawford was the only candidate approved by the incoming administration leaders to have any opposition. J. Cline Elyson of Hammond, contesting him for the house speakership. Elyson withdrew after the vote had been taken but before the count was completed, and the election was made unanimous.

The senators at their caucus left it to Townsend, Senator of Ketchum and Senator Chambers to appoint a committee to act with a like committee of the house in having platform and administration bills drafted. They in turn appointed John Bright Webb, Indianapolis, chairman of the senate committee and Ira Clouser, Crawfordsville, and Walter Vermillion of Anderson, as the 000,000 of secured debentures, other members. The house committee were not announced by Crawford last night.

Chicago, Dec. 16.—Machine gun assassins killed John Rinella, 30, suburban roadhouse owner, today after an argument over his refusal to deal with a new and mysterious liquor syndicate which has sprung up in opposition to the remnants of Al Capone's gang.

Rinella was found sprawled behind the bar of the club, a west suburban roadhouse which he acquired two months ago, by Miss Marie Flack, aged 29, who described herself as his sweetheart. His body was riddled with bullets.

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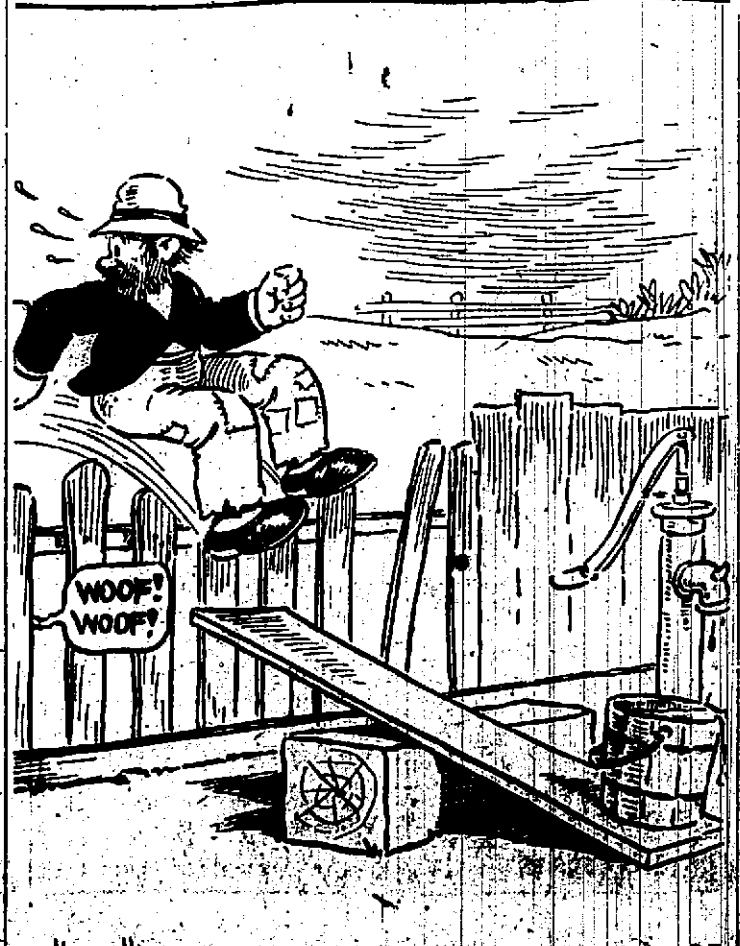
